

IMPROVING WATER QUALITY ACROSS THE REGION

In the coming years, Potomac Conservancy will:

Advocate in **Frederick County, Maryland**, for sustainable revenue sources to fund polluted runoff controls

Partner with the Heavy Construction and Contractors Association to design and build a public service project in Loudoun County, Virginia.

Pursue important land protection opportunities in **West Virginia** in headwaters of the South Branch.

Launch a comprehensive assessment of regulatory barriers to using river-friendly development practices for all 10 Maryland counties in the Potomac Watershed and the District of Columbia.

Grow the movement for clean water by engaging at least 10,000 individuals throughout the region in active volunteer programming for trail and river clean-up projects, seed collections and tree plantings, and as ambassadors for river-friendly practices.



UNITING WATER, LAND, AND PEOPLE

Along its journey, the Potomac travels through landscapes that are as varied as the communities it sustains. As the river moves from rushing mountain streams to the slack tidal waters near the Chesapeake Bay, it is contaminated with polluted runoff from impervious surfaces like roads and parking lots, as well as unprotected fields. We believe the foundation of healthy, sustainable, and connected communities starts with clean water.

LEADING THE WAY

Potomac Conservancy is the region's leading clean water advocate. We drive the region's clean water movement by providing the tools that empower local landowners, activists, volunteers, partners, donors, and all river champions to lead the charge for clean drinking water, healthy lands, and safe access to the river.

LAND PROTECTION

Through our land conservation program, Potomac Conservancy helps protect water quality from future threats by permanently protecting land in the headwaters regions. We work one-on-one with private landowners to protect forested and open space lands in the headwaters regions, and provide resources to ensure our working lands are both productive and river-friendly. To date, and with the partnership of 76 landowners, we have protected more than 13,100 acres and more than 93 riparian miles across Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, and the District of Columbia.


CLEAN WATER ADVOCACY

Potomac Conservancy, in partnership with diverse coalitions and our vibrant river constituencies, fights hard to restore water quality by advocating sound policy and promoting thoughtful land management. We work in targeted jurisdictions to successfully urge passage of riverfriendly land use policies that encourage green infrastructure, smart growth planning, and best management practices (BMPs) that lead to broad and profound impacts on water quality.

COMMUNITY CONSERVATION

Each year, Potomac Conservancy mobilizes thousands of volunteers, connecting them to their local lands and waters through hands-on restoration activities to raise awareness, inspire action, and empower friends and neighbors to make a difference in our communities.

Volunteer efforts range from shoreline trash clean-ups to the removal of invasive plant species; and from staffing the Conservancy's River Center at Lock 8 on the C&O Canal to planting trees in the spring and fall. It is the Conservancy's volunteers who are at the forefront of a growing local movement for clean water, showing us how to have fun while making the Potomac cleaner and healthier.




