In moments when I feel overwhelmed by the crush of work left to do for our home and our river, I like to remember our own role in nature and the impact we can have right here in our own backyards.

The collective force of nature that is the Potomac Conservancy community of 31,000+ friends, activists, volunteers, and donors is driving powerful change for clean water and healthy families.

In the past year, in the face of a changing world and unstable climate, our movement has been inspired and empowered by our love for the Potomac River – its waters, lands, beauty, and spirit.

Your support was a lifeline that helped us grow and evolve in a year that challenged us all. We have:

- Launched two land conservation collaboratives that have secured millions of dollars in grants to support small farms and reduce agricultural pollution in the Shenandoah Valley
- Adapted our clean water advocacy agenda to face the current moment by pushing for local laws that address reckless deforestation, the climate crisis, and environmental justice
- Grew our Volunteer Leadership Team to expand our shoreline cleanups into new communities and plant the seeds for our upcoming forest growth initiative

We also launched a first-of-its-kind local Climate Report, *Rising to the Challenge*, which explores how the climate crisis is uniquely impacting the Potomac River region and the equitable nature-based solutions we must invest in to restore clean water and ensure our communities thrive.

One of the best ways we can protect the health of our communities is to harness the power of nature itself.

Together, we will safeguard our streams and wetlands from development, restore trees that capture carbon and filter pollution, and empower our neighbors to advocate for the forests and natural areas where they live.

Like the trickle that becomes a stream which becomes a river which becomes an ocean, our clean water work is the seed of something bigger than itself. The Potomac River is the soul of our region – providing us with recreation, drinking water, industry, food, identity, and hope in a time of crisis.

With your ongoing commitment to this mission, we can continue to protect the powerful Potomac and make it a swimmable, fishable river for generations to come.

Founded in 1993, Potomac Conservancy is the region's leading clean water advocate. As a member-supported nonprofit, we work to improve water quality through conservation and advocacy, and to empower a local movement of over 31,000 landowners, activists, volunteers, and partners to lead the charge for clean streams and river friendly lands.

Our Land Protection program has always been more about working with people than land. Sixteen years ago, John Venskoske approached the Lord Fairfax Soil & Water Conservation District with concerns about water quality in the creek that ran through his cattle farm. Their work together piqued his conservation interests and led him to Potomac Conservancy.

John's friendship with our team and worries about the legacy of the land he'd farmed since 1947 launched a rewarding and impactful journey for both of us. Together, we permanently protected Sunny Acres Farm with a conservation easement, secured restoration aid, and planted a 35-foot buffer of trees along Back Creek. Filtering runoff and stabilizing stream banks, these trees forever ensure fresh water flows to the creek and on to Potomac.

Individual relationships like these are the springs that swell to vast land protections throughout our watershed.

Thanks to your support, we expanded our strategic collaborative partnerships with other organizations working in the headwaters of the Shenandoah Valley and West Virginia. To these partnerships, we bring our decades-old relationships with family farmers as well as invaluable technical land trust expertise.

Best of all, as a collective force we can advocate for critical funding to support river-friendly farming practices, public land protections, mass tree plantings, and the resources required to implement all of the above.

When it comes to the safety of our water and health of our communities, the stakes are too high to leave the decisions to others. As part of our local movement, you empower us to effectively advocate for clean water protection laws – measures that reduce polluted runoff, protect riverside forests, and combat the climate crisis right here at home.

We know you count on us to never back down from a fight.

After efforts to invest in forest restoration in Maryland were nearly derailed by political squabbles, our network of community members, activists, and partner organizations stepped in to find common ground and work with elected leaders to make good on their promises.

As a result, in Spring 2021, Potomac Conservancy celebrated Maryland's passage of the Tree Solutions Now Act, a huge

conservation victory that commits to planting 5 million trees in the state over the next ten years.

We know that fighting for clean water, climate, and justice does not end when bills pass or fail. With your renewed support this year, we will work with key stakeholders to ensure the trees are planted equitably and strategically, and we'll continue to fight for nature-based solutions that reduce pollution in the Potomac River and local streams.

Thank you for helping us strengthen and grow the coalition of partners, experts, policymakers, and advocates that watch our elected leaders like a hawk and bring attention to the concerns of our most vulnerable populations.





For decades, Potomac Conservancy's Community Conservation program has brought volunteers to local parks to collect the trash and plastic that pollutes our stream banks. But each year, stronger storms and intense flooding bring more litter to our river. Every full trash bag is rewarding, but it can feel like just a drop of water in a roaring river.

Enter our Volunteer Leadership Team. From its founding in summer of 2020 to this winter, our squad of trained Volunteer Leaders has swelled from 12 to 26 river advocates dedicated to battling debris and beyond.

This team stepped up in a big way, shepherding us through the pandemic and allowing us to host more cleanup events, remove more trash from our river, and connect with more volunteers than ever before. But more than that, they are bringing attention to small streams and parks that are often overlooked. We are working alongside them and their neighbors to fight back against litter that pollutes our waterways.

Our Volunteer Leaders are the foundation for organizing a community of activists that are a collective force tackling the root causes of pollution in the Potomac River.

With your support next year, our Volunteer Leadership Team will serve as the roots of our initiative to collect indigenous tree seeds to supply forest planting programs. The forests grown from these seeds will capture carbon and prevent pollution from entering our rivers and drinking water sources.

Our organically grown volunteer network is a force for nature. As it germinates and branches throughout the Potomac River region, there's nothing it can't tackle: feelings of isolation, plastic pollution, and more. Most of all, it sprouts hope for the future of our local environment and communities.






